News from Whidbey Island Water Systems Association

Annual Meeting

Our Annual Meeting was held on December 15th, 2022. Unfortunately, due to the holiday season (and a Seahawks game?) attendance was low and we just failed to achieve a quorum. We held a special meeting on January 5, 2023, and fortunately sufficient members were in attendance to constitute a quorum. The members voted to approve the proposed bylaw changes (see below), to apply for a Public Participation Grant (see below) to reelect Joe Grogan as a director, and to approve the 2023 association budget. Full minutes will be posted once they have been approved by the board.

Bylaw Changes

Key Changes


- The membership approved opening full voting membership to private well owners and to associate members such as service providers. This better reflects participation in our meetings.
- The membership approved increasing the number of directors from five to nine. This will give the board more capacity to handle the ever-increasing workload and make sure that all classes of members can be represented.

Public Participation Grant

Ecology's Solid Waste Management Program Management Team has conditionally approved WIWSA's application for an emergency <u>Public Participation Grant</u>. This grant will provide funding to help WIWSA to increase public understanding and involvement in cleaning up PFAS contamination in groundwater. The membership approved completing our application for this grant.

December 27, 2022, Storm



The December 27, 2022, flooding around Whidbey Island was a foretaste of a future with climate change and sea level rise. The flooding highlights the risks our water systems face from sea water intrusion and other potential problems such as inundation of equipment, loss of power, and contamination from damaged sewer and septic infrastructure. Operator of the Year. To recognize an operator for their dedication and commitment. They also help educate and mentor others in the water industry, lending help and knowledge where needed.
