Q2/2026 Member's Meeting—June 16, 2026; 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm IN-PERSON and ZOOM

RECAP: Q1/2026 Member's Meeting; March 19, 2026; 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm IN-PERSON and ZOOM

Thanks to everyone who attended the first 2026 Member's Meeting which was held in person on Thursday, March 19, 2026 at the Coupeville Library and online over Zoom. There was a quorum present at the library with over 40 people attending and another 20+ people joining on Zoom. The meeting was a lively discussion over Island County's new franchise requirements among the community members, county, state and industry representatives, followed by some general Q&A where members exchanged their expertise and experience. Thank you to Ed Sewester from Island County Public Works, and Joanne Skaar and the NW Natural team for participating in the Franchise discussion.

After summarizing WIWSA's December letter on the franchise topic (presented at January's 2025 Annual Meeting), WIWSA President Randi Perry introduced Ed Sewester (Island County Public Works). Ed reviewed the current Franchise program status along with the objectives of the new requirements that had been announced in a letter sent by the county to Franchise holders last September. He said that maintaining road integrity and limiting repair and maintenance costs is a large factor in developing the new requirements.

Ed was followed by Joanne Skaar (NW Natural Water Services) and members of the NW Natural team who gave the water operator perspective on the impact these requirements would have on the water system operations and expenses. They made a case that compliance requires more than running a few tests. The preparation, communications and coordination demand personnel and time to execute, all of which detracts from the 24/7 operations effort that is on-going.

Many audience members asked questions and provided feedback which Ed indicated, would be shared with the County Commissioners. Some particular requests are that the new franchise requirements must recognize that the Satellite Management Agencies, who currently manage the water systems, are the best qualified to provide any certification required, and that the county should be working with the fire districts directly in establishing any fire hydrant inspection and testing requirements.

RECAP: Group B Meetup; April 16, 2026; 5:00 to 6:30 pm ZOOM Only

The first Group B meeting for 2026 was held on April 16, 2026 over Zoom with 13 Group B water systems represented and about 20 attendees all together. This is an abbreviated recap, you can find the full [recap on our website](#) with links to the recordings and presentation.

Michael Quintus, Whidbey Island Water Systems Association (WIWSA) board member led the meeting and presented a [review of Cook Water Supply Operations](#), an 8-connection Group B system in North Whidbey that he manages for his community. It's a nicely designed and well-maintained system which includes 2 source wells along with filtering systems for both arsenic and manganese. Island County's Aneta Hupfauer and Tracy Hall spoke about Group B

planning and introduced a streamlined template for Group B water systems to prepare a draft plan.

Once more in 2026, WIWSA is teaming with Evergreen Rural Water (ERWOW) to offer a scholarship for an applicant of Evergreen's one-year [QUEST](#) program or their full two-year [Apprenticeship](#) program. We would like to enroll at least one new participant this year.

QUEST applicants will receive training for Level 1 certification in Water Treatment and Water Distribution Management. Local municipal and SMA employers are invited to sponsor applicants from their organizations, along with Group A water systems looking to certify back up operators. The full Apprenticeship program takes the applicant through to Level 2

certification and is intended for those working in the field to enable on-the-job apprenticeship as well as classroom time.

We are actively recruiting scholarship applicants for either of these programs (Apprenticeship or QUEST), and are looking for help with outreach to employers and educational programs to recruit potential applicants. WIWSA's scholarship covers full tuition for either program.

- [State Representative Clyde Shavers co-sponsored HB 1906 - 2025-26 \(Increasing transparency and consumer protection in water system rates\)](#); a bill introduced last year that has made it through the legislative process and been signed by the governor. - [Home connecting to Navy waterline after PFAS detected in well](#); A North Whidbey home is being added to the Navy's waterline as the result of harmful per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS, in a private drinking water well.
- [Washington ranks 37th for tap water quality in new national study](#); The study analyzed the latest data from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to track how often community water systems violated safety standards. Washington averaged 1,991 violations per 100,000 residents. While that might sound high, it is still far cleaner than states at the bottom of the list like Alaska, which recorded over 21,000 violations per 100,000 people.

News from our Partners

Island County

- In 2025 the county commissioned a third-party consultant to conduct a review of the Coordinated Water System Plan (CWSP) and earlier this year launched a [webpage to provide information on the update process](#). Recently the Board of County Commissioners approved a resolution forming the Water Utility Coordinating Committee (WUCC) to oversee the project and the initial report was released with recommendations for the upcoming project. Department of Ecology

- [SHARP dashboard tracks contaminated site ratings](#): Ecology started using the Site Hazard Assessment and Ranking Process (SHARP) to assess contaminated sites in January 2024. There is now a real-time dashboard to track the status of about 6,500 contaminated sites in Washington that need cleanup or are being cleaned up. They range from small gasoline spills on dirt to complex mixes of different chemicals impacting soil, water, or air over hundreds of acres. Currently there are six (6) sites in Island County included on the dashboard; check it out [here](#).
- [Filing deadline for water rights claims extended to June 2027](#); Water users in Whatcom and Skagit counties affected by Water Resources Inventory Area 1 water rights adjudication have had their filing deadlines extended by 13 months following a March 9 Whatcom County Superior Court decision.
- [Statewide drought declared due to dismal snowpack](#); Near-record low snowpack threatens summer water supplies.
- [Yakima Basin water supply update—Fourth year of drought](#); On April 8, DOE declared a statewide drought emergency, the fourth in a row for the Yakima Basin. Declaring a drought allows for \$3 million in drought relief grants to address hardships on agriculture and communities.
